



Mock Exams 10/11 to 21/11: The Plan

- All exams start at 9:15 am and 1:15 pm as that's reflective of the real exam series.
- Year 11s will be welcome from 8:20 in the Winter Gardens where they can grab a snack while revising
- Exam briefings for the students will take place every morning in the Activity Studio at 8:45
- The Exam Timetable is released tonight so grab your copy!
- Access/small room students will have bespoke timetables with some adjusted starts and finishes
- We will support with exam seating issues: please contact Mrs Hill if you need support during the mock window



Mock Exams 10/11 to 21/11: The Plan

- Autumn/Spring Mock Exams—we will visit non-attenders and ask them to plug gaps in knowledge
- We will sanction students who disrupt mock exams in order to avoid disqualification in the real exam
- We will support students to get used to exam conditions and minimise interruptions (eg no toilet breaks unless a student has a toilet pass)
- We will work with students to overcome barriers eg mobile phone storage during exams



Mock Exams 10/11 to 21/11: The Plan

- Toilets are strongly discouraged unless you have a toilet pass
- Lesson 6 and after school private tutoring will continue
- Invigilators will issue a warning and write it on the records
- Miss Hill, Miss Lowe and Miss Fairbank will call home daily
- Refusals after reasonable adjustments will be sanctioned

- GCSE exam results open and close doors
- 5 Grade 5s (Maths/English)=secure Post 16 place on Level 3 programmes
- Grade 4 in Maths and English is a government expectation; those who do not secure at in year 11 cannot take a Level 3 Post 16 place
- The above means students have to continue resitting Maths and English
- The above means not being able to access university of higher level apprenticeships
- The above means staying at college for 3 years (in some cases), rather than 2 years






Revision Clocks

What are they?

- Visual study tools that divides a topic into 12 manageable segments
- Students can fill each segment with information from memory or notes
- Assign a specific time limit (such as 5 minutes) to each segment to work through the topic systematically.




Flash Cards

What are they?

Cards which can test your memory, which improves long-term retention.

They chunk down important information letting students test


themselves (or get others to test them!)



Quizzing

How does quizzing work?

- Actively testing yourself to retrieve information from memory, rather than passively re-reading notes.
- Completing practice questions (short answer or multiple choice), or performing a "brain dump" of everything you remember on a topic.
- Sparx would be great for Maths/Science for this technique
- Students could link this technique to their revision cards

Timing is everything!



In the real exam, every 15 minutes, we move onto the next question (whether we are finished or not!)

We will pick up more marks this way.

We won't be doing this yet; we'll build up to this.

Our exams will start at 9am so we'll practise like this.

As you only have 45 minutes to write your story, it's important to write something that is developed, effective and engaging in that time. Overly ambitious plots will be too difficult to achieve in this exam. Anything implausible within a timeframe needs to also be avoided.

Examiners like stories with a **realistic and believable plot**. The best stories are about candidates' own experiences, otherwise known as **an anecdote**. They make the reader care about the narrator and the other character(s) in the story. It's also easier to remember a narrative is it based (or loosely based) on something that actually happened.

Keep the time frame short, limit the number of characters (me + 1) and focus on one location or setting.






We have new timing strategy for C2

Twenty/Twenty/Twenty

Every **twenty** minutes, you do **two** questions.

Section B Timings:



As we know from the reading sections and narrative writing, timings are everything! This is the same in the writing section of C2 too. Two 'perfect 30s' will guarantee a great grade.

What we do every time: The three Rs

- 1. Rule off under the line numbers answering outside the lines will waste valuable minutes and will not be credited on the mark scheme.
- 2. Read the question and underline or highlight the key words what or who is the focus?
- Record each question number in the margin 1, 2, etc. Leave a gap between each question as you can always return to it if you have some spare time.

- There are 30 marks for Section B and 32 marks for Section C.

Questions

Section A Modern texts: students will answer one essay question from a choice of two on their studied modern prose or drama text.

Section B Poetry: students will answer one comparative question on one named poem printed on the paper and one other poem from their chosen anthology cluster.


